Polish Freedom Weekend 2025 - "Freedom Is a Woman"

11 – 17 November 2025 | Düsseldorf (with supporting events in Frankfurt am Main, Darmstadt and Essen)

The Polish Institute Düsseldorf presents the 2025 edition of "Polish Freedom Weekend", a multi-faceted cultural project that explores the theme of freedom through the lenses of women's experiences, voices and creativity. Under the title "Freedom Is a Woman" the programme invites audiences to engage with art, film, literature, music and discourse that centre around female agency, cultural memory and social transformation.

Key programme highlights

- * A feature-film retrospective of acclaimed Polish filmmaker Barbara Sass, whose work charts the shifting terrain of women's lives in modern Poland.
- * A documentary exhibition "Doppelt frei" (Doubly Free) commemorating the Polish suffragette movement and the attainment of women's voting rights in Poland already 1918.
- * A solo exhibition by Polish artist Alicja Bielawska, whose poetic visual work evokes fragility and resilience in female identity.
- * A music & narrative performance that brings to life the stories of Polish and German women of the inter-war period between the both world wars bridging history, storytelling and live sound.
- * A major discussion & conference on feminism, artistic freedom and equality, bringing together cultural practitioners from Poland and Germany with focus on Polish women in the Rhine region.
- * A special concert with cellist Dobrawa Czocher and pianist/synth-artist Natalia Czekała, combining classical and experimental sound worlds in a powerful finale to the Polish Freedom Weekend.

Background & Concept

Polish Freedom Weekend was inaugurated by the Polish Institute Düsseldorf with the intention of offering a high-profile cultural window into Poland's evolving freedoms — particularly through the lens of artistic expression and bilateral Polish-German dialogue. It is held annually on the first weekend following Poland's National Independence Day (11th November).

In 2025 the focus shifts explicitly to female freedom: how women have shaped, and continue to shape, the cultural, political and social landscape — in Poland, Germany and beyond. The Institute aims to amplify under-represented voices, explore questions of equity and autonomy, and foster reflection through contemporary culture and exchange.
