CATALOGUE

The catalogue *All the King's Tapestries: Homecomings 2021–1961–1921* accompanies the exhibition of the same name on view at Wawel Royal Castle from March 18 through October 31, 2021.

The exhibition commemorates the 100th anniversary of the Treaty of Riga, which sealed Poland's victory in the Polish-Soviet War of 1919–1921. The terms of the treaty made possible the restitution from Soviet Russia of the tapestry collection of King Sigismund II Augustus. It also commemorates the 60th anniversary of the return of the tapestry collection from Canada, where it had been taken for safekeeping following it's evacuation from Poland during World War II. All 137 tapestries that are preserved in Poland are on view in the exhibition. The collection, which was designed specifically for Wawel Castle, is being displayed in its entirety for the first time since the days of Sigismund II Augustus.

Sigismund II Augustus's collection of Flemish tapestries, the largest ever completed as a single commission, was produced in 1550–1560 in Brussels, then the leading tapestry center in Europe. Woven of the finest wool and silk with gold and silver threads, textiles such as these were made for powerful, rich, and sophisticated patrons. The Wawel tapestries are among the finest ever made. The accessible, informative text deals with the various aspects of the collection including its scope, history, makers, tapestry types, and the characteristics and functions of its constituent series. Magdalena Piwocka's clear commentary on the style and attribution of the cartoons, as well has her discussion of the tapestries' rich symbolism and varied subject helps the reader to better appreciate their beauty and historic significance. The richly illustrated volume brings into focus monumental Biblical scenes, complex figural compositions, and eloquent portraits as well as the exquisite verdure tapestries with animals depicted in lush landscape settings. The book includes a glossary of terms and select bibliography.



VOLUME I: THE TAPESTRIES OF KING SIGISMUND II AUGUSTUS: A HISTORY Maria Hennel-Bernasikowa

This book, the first volume of the three-volume catalogue raisonné of the tapestry collection of Sigismund II Augustus of Poland, covers the 450-year history of the collection. Originally numbering 170 pieces, it was the largest-ever tapestry commission woven for a single patron. The gold-woven tapestries were produced in Brussels between 1550 and 1560. They were designed by leading tapestry cartoonists such as Michiel I Coxcie, and produced by master weavers such as Pieter van Aelst, Willem de Kempeneer, and Jan van Tieghem, to name a few. Intimately entwined with Poland's often turbulent history, over the centuries the collection was put up as collateral, narrowly escaped plunder during the Polish-Swedish Wars, only to be looted in the next century by Catherine the Great of Russia.Restituted under the peace treaty ending the Polish-Bolshevik War in the 1920s, it had to be evacuated to Canada during World War II to escape Nazi looting. It finally returned to Wawel for good in 1961.

This scholarly volume contextualizes Sigismund II Augustus's collecting passions and sheds new light on a number of significant events in the history of the collection. It is the first English-language publication of this scope on the history of the tapestries of the last Jagiellon.
